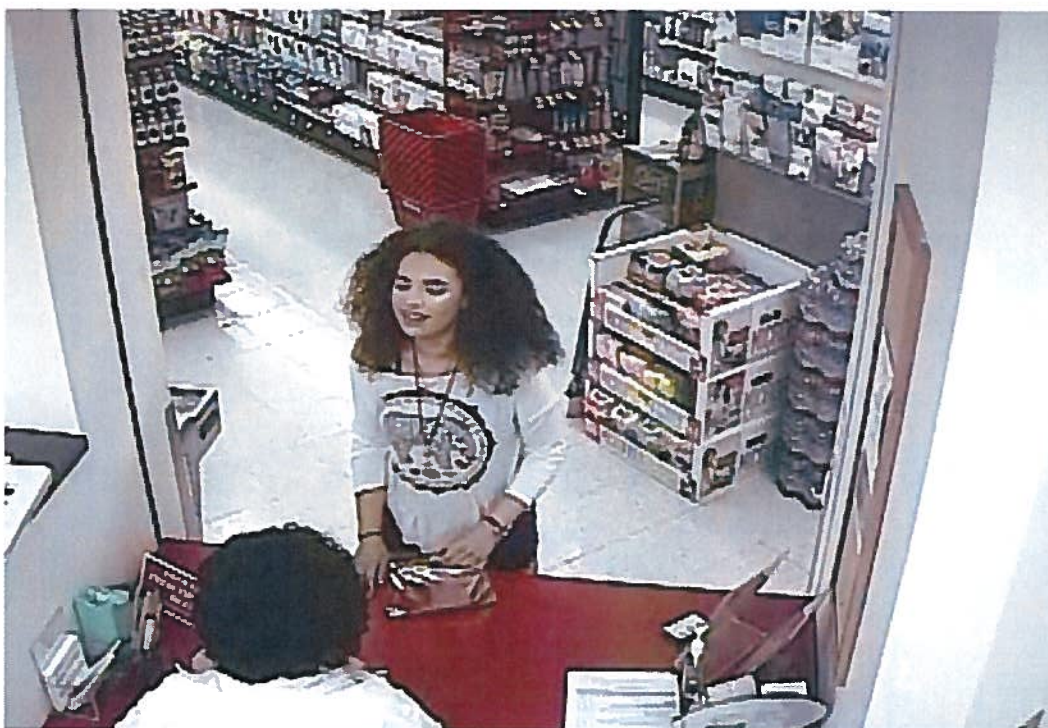
There were very few incidents in June. One incident involved an assault that was alleged to be occurring for about a month and a half in a classroom. The incident involved a male student head-butting a female student on multiple occasions. The female claimed she had received a concussion and needed her braces adjusted. The case was investigated and many of the complaints could not be substantiated. It was found the male head butted the female twice in a joking manner. The female and male have been friends for several years. No witnesses could be located to show the head-butting was hard enough to cause discomfort and it could not be shown the male head-butted the female to intentionally hurt or assault her.



A freshman student was with two other students toward the end of the school day. The two students told the freshman it would be funny to pull the fire alarm. The freshman walked by the fire alarm and pulled the handle activating the system. The school was evacuated for about 20 minutes and the fire department responded. The freshman was referred to Denny Youth Center for tampering with a fire alarm.

School concluded on June 20th and will resume on September 6th.

Prescription Fraud



On 06-07-17 an adult female attempted to use a forged prescription at two local pharmacies. On 06-19-17 the same female attempted to use a forged prescription at one of the same locations, but changed her appearance to include straightening her hair and wearing it in a pony tail. Deputy Peckham was able to identify the female from information she provided at one of the pharmacies. On 06-26-17 Sgt. G. Sanders and Detective Martin attempted contact with the female at a home in North Seattle, but no one answered the door. Detective Martin will make additional attempts to contact the female before referring the case to the Prosecutor's Office.

Storage Unit Theft

On 06-15-17 and 06-19-17 a male subject entered a local storage unit facility and stole items from several individual units. The male gained entry to the facility by cutting a hole in the fence.

WSP Lab Results

Deputy Willoth investigated a vehicle prowling complaint in August, 2016 and submitted several latent print cards to the Washington State Patrol Laboratory. The lab results returned on 06-19-17 identifying a male subject with an address in the Marysville area. Detective Martin will attempt to locate the subject and interview him reference the incident.

Assault of a Child

On 06-12-17 Deputy Chaney responded to an assault complaint involving a four year old child. The victim's family has been referred to the Dawson Place Child Advocacy Center in Everett. Detective Martin completed the investigation and referred the case to the Prosecutor's Office.



Focus on Offenders

One of our targeted offenders recently completed an inpatient drug treatment program and has been assigned transitional housing in another city. One of our nuisance properties is reported to be in the process of being sold. Reports of a transient activity at the location have been reduced significantly.
